NOTE FROM THE PLAYWRIGHT

During times of struggle, love is what carries us through. Love is what gives us hope and inspires us to action – to go, to do, to change. When first commissioned to write THIS BITTER EARTH in 2015, I was asked, "can you talk about what it's like to move about the world in a black body during these times?" In 2022, the same question is still being asked, and an answer is still hard to find. What has carried through though, is the importance of moments of love – large and small – between the moments of struggle. THIS BITTER EARTH is a love story about two men finding each other and finding their voices in an extremely challenging time, and the ways in which their love changes them forever. Through love, Jesse feels safe and supported in exploring the ways that he is comfortable interacting with his blackness and his activism in a country that does its best to make him feel unworthy. Through love, Neil, Jesse's white partner, is called to activism, becoming a passionate advocate for his partner's life and for all Black lives.

In 2022, when distance is encouraged due to covid and Black lives are still being ended by police, the connections that bring us together are more important than ever. The story of two men finding and loving each other in spite of the world's coldness, then persevering in the face of tragedy and uncertainty, reminds us that life is the small moments of joy found within each other, even when the world tells us that what keeps us apart is most important.

NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

We live in a time in which all of our choices are politicized within an imaginary binary. Likewise, many of our society's systems uphold a polarized "black or white" way of thinking, created to highlight and enforce our differences. But it is in the gray areas – where two truths exist in the same breath – that we have the potential to find real understanding and recognize the multitudinous intersections of our own humanity.

In Harrison David Rivers' play THIS BITTER EARTH we meet two men, Jesse and Neil, who choose to lean into the gray areas and connect in a world determined to divide. Set between 2012 - 2015, a period wrought with racial and political tension, and the urgency of the Black Lives Matter movement, lies a beautiful and powerful interracial queer love story. Against all odds these seemingly opposite beings defy the racial, political, and class divisions of their reality and dare to love. Through poetry, rage, laughter, and protest, Jesse and Neil remind us of the various roles we are called to play in the revolution, the personal reflection necessary for growth, and the power of love to bring about the change we need.

Revisiting this play in 2022, after more than two years of loss, uncertainty, isolation and a long overdue reckoning, set off by a global pandemic and the continued violence against Black bodies, I'm struck by the poignancy of this work to reflect both the past and the current dilemmas we face as a society. Where has leading with fear, division, and the oppression of Black and brown bodies led us? How might we take the time to listen to each other and lead with compassion, care, and love? As Jesse and Neil teach us, maybe through knowing love "this bitter earth... may not, oh be so bitter after all."



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
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
