Although you don't need to be a basketball fan to understand this play, if you heard "King James" and thought it was about the Bible or Shakespeare, rather than the NBA's all-time highest scorer, you may appreciate a little context about LeBron James and the City of Cleveland.

Our play spans 2004-2016, beginning with LeBron's rookie season -- a sudden success for Cleveland after decades of sports humiliation. Despite many wins, the Cavaliers struggled to win the championship, and in 2010, LeBron left for the Miami Heat, prompting extreme fan backlash. After success in Miami, LeBron returned to Cleveland in 2014, and in 2016 broke the city's 50 year sports curse.

And that is the backdrop for this story of friendship (with a little basketball).

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
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Full-Court Friendship: The Origins of King James

Many friendships involve sitting at a bar, watching basketball, and arguing with each other. For playwright Rajiv Joseph and actor Glenn Davis, that's how their friendship began. But in their case, that friendship and their shared love of basketball grew into KING JAMES – a play about friendship between two basketball fans.

Years before Rajiv started writing KING JAMES, the two men first met while working on the 2009 world premiere of Rajiv's first major

play, Bengal Tiger at the Baghdad Zoo. (Glenn had, appropriately enough, heard about the play during a game of pickup basketball with another actor.) During rehearsals for Bengal Tiger, the two men would spend their dinner breaks at Rush Street sports bar watching LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers in the playoffs. This was both the foundation of their friendship and the seed for KING JAMES: it was during these nights at the bar where the Cleveland-born Rajiv and the Chicago-transplant Glenn would debate whether LeBron or Michael Jordan was truly the Greatest Of All Time. One night, Glenn challenged Rajiv to write a play about the GOAT, to which Rajiv replied "Okay, I'll write a play about LeBron." Additionally (and more seriously), Glenn suggested his friend write a two-person play for him to perform in, ideally at Steppenwolf. Those two challenges eventually

Looking back on the early stages of the play, Rajiv says it started with nostalgia: "I had been rooting for LeBron for so many years at that point. I was aware of how much this guy had been in my life, and I think I was feeling pre-nostalgia. You know, 'it's gonna be sad when LeBron's no longer playing basketball, when this guy's no longer in my life as an athlete.' And when I feel that pang of nostalgia, my instinct is to write about it. Because that's a way of holding on to something."

connected, resulting in KING JAMES.

As a Cleveland native, there are other touches of nostalgia woven into the play. For instance, the first half of the play is set at La Cave du Vin, an actual Cleveland wine bar where Rajiv and his college friends were regulars. The second half takes place in Armand's, a family-run antique shop: it too is based on a real place. "Not quite as crazy as it's presented in the play, but there was a consignment shop that I bought my first tuxedo at, a used tuxedo, when I was a junior in high school, called Armand's Echo. And I always laughed at that name, I thought that name was so interesting. So I named this place Armand's."

But the heart of the play is friendship. Specifically, that uniquely masculine friendship, where sports provides a cover for the emotional vulnerability that men have traditionally not allowed themselves to express. As Glenn puts it, in discussing the GOAT debate, "It's a way that we relate. It's not meant to end, it's not meant to convince. It's a way of saying to the other person 'I appreciate you, and I want to be engaged in this dialogue with you. I appreciate who you are in my life."

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
